

Sid You Know!

**Thurible** – The vessel used for burning incense.

**Thurifer** – An acolyte who carries the thurible.

**Veil, Chalice** – A square silk cloth used to cover the chalice and paten at Mass.

**Vespers- (1)** One of the seven Breviary Offices. (2) Another name for the Office of Evening Prayer.

Vestments – Garments worn by members of the clergy.

**Vestry** - (1) In the American Church, the group of lay people elected by parishioners to lead the parish in financial and secular affairs. (2) In England, the name for the sacristy.

**Vicar** – (1) A priest who has charge of a mission church (as contrasted to a parish) or (2) a priest who assists the Rector or Priest-in-Charge of a parish.

**Vocation** – The call to a career or position, especially used with regard to the ordained ministry and/or the Religious Life (monks, nuns, friars, etc.)

**Votive Lights** – Candles lighted to represent prayers offered at a Shrine.

Wafer - A disc of unleavened bread used in Holy Communion.

Wardens - Two lay officers of a parish, chosen by election. Most

commonly designated as the Senior Warden and Junior Warden.

Water, Holy -. The usual name for water which (1) has been blessed to serve as a reminder of Baptism and is found in fonts at the doors of a church. (2) Water used in blessing people or objects such as palms on Palm Sunday, crosses, statues, etc.

The parish of All Saints Pontiac was formed in 1869 with the direct aid of Robert Knight, owner of the Pontiac Mills. He felt that the employees of his mills deserved the right to hold religious services, there being none held in the vicinity at that time. He agreed to pay half of the rector's salary while the remainder was paid by the parishioners.

The Chapel of All Saints was in fact the second floor of the company store. Mrs. Robert Knight took great interest in the new parish and enlisted the aid of her pastor, the Reverend Mr. William Kellogg of Grace Church Providence. Mr. Kellogg held the first service in the Chapel on the Sunday before Easter in 1869. From this day on no Sunday passed without Church services being held in Pontiac.

When the Reverend Emory H. Porter took charge of the parish there were only five communicants. During his pastorship the Church and parish were strengthened and finally established. Within the year and a half he was at All Saints Chapel fifteen communicants were added and the attendance at the regular services greatly increased.

As the parish grew the need for a Church grew. Mr. Knight aided in the construction of a building, which we know today as All Saints Church. The cornerstone was laid on Saturday, November 12, 1887 at 3:15. The box placed under the cornerstone contains: a copy of the New Testament, a Prayer Book, a Hymnal, reports of the R.I. Episcopal Convention for 1869 and for 1887, a letter from S. N. Bourne, formerly the agent for the mill and bleachery at Pontiac, a letter from Reverend E. H. Porter, the first rector of the parish, extracts from the parish records in reference to the formation of the parish and the adoption of its constitution, a list of the rectors, the names of the present officers, a statement by the rector regarding the present condition of the church and its work during the year, copies of the Churchman, of the Pawtuxet Valley Gleaner, of the Providence Journal and of the Evening Bulletin.

Barbara Lewis Devens, 83, of Providence, R.I., passed away Aug. 10, 2021, from complications due to carcinoid cancer. The daughter of Ralph H. Nay and Margaret W. Lewis, she was born June 11, 1938, and raised in Old Greenwich, CT.

She went on to graduate from Boston University and got her master's degree from Wheelock College. Barbara was an unfailingly kind and compassionate person who loved nothing more than spending time with family and friends and exploring her passions for poetry, puzzles, history, mysteries and musicals and, not least of all, the literature of WWI. She enjoyed travel, especially to Great War sites in France, to Liberia where she volunteered at a children's hospital, and finally to Kenya, where she spent her final 18 months.

She was a selfless, devoted single mother who raised four daughters while juggling a professional life that included teaching at both the grade school and college levels as well as several years at the Rhode Island Hospital and Hasbro Children's Hospital as a Child Life Development Specialist. After retiring, she continued her devotion to literature through, among other activities, poetry and book groups she led at Laurelmead, the retirement community she lived in and truly loved, until 2020.

Barbara also cared enormously for nature and animals, and cried easily and often at happy things, sad things, simple things, a trait that revealed her natural empathy. Her greatest gifts were how deeply she felt and how deeply she connected with the world on a soulful level. She was never superficial or selfish but genuine, optimistic, and welcoming to all.

She is preceded in death by her partner, Lester Keats, and her English Bulldog, the other beloved Lester in her life. She is survived by her sister Liz Lewis (Charlotte, NC), her daughters Jennifer Ryan (Denver, NC), Cynthia Ryan (Nairobi, Kenya), Kimberly Dano (Nashville, TN), and Stephanie Ditenhafer (Nashville, TN), her beloved grandchildren, nieces and nephew, and former husbands The Rev. Philip Devens and Vincent Ryan.

The family will share plans for a Celebration of Life ceremony at a future date. In lieu of flowers, the family asks that donations be made to The Carcinoid Cancer Foundation.




