Coming Christ & Expectant People

The Rev. Dr. James N. Jacob Priest in Charge

As we approach another Christmas and New Year season it is time to look back and see how we spent this year and to look forward with great expectancy to a new year. In the Eucharist liturgy we say the words, 'Christ has died, Christ is risen, Christ will come again'. This shows the past, the present and the future of our faith. We have the foundation of our faith based on Christ's coming to the world, we live a life trusting the resurrected Christ and we have the hope for the second coming of Christ. In Titus 2:13, Paul describes Jesus' second coming as the church's "blessed hope."

We are living in a world of many challenges and turmoils in personal, national and international lives. We are coming out of a big pandemic, a war is still going on in Ukraine and we just finished an election. In the midst of all these we are getting ready for the celebration of Christmas. Are these celebrations just seasonal commercial and social events? That depends on how we give them meaning and relevance in our lives.

Among all the busy planning, travels and family get-togethers we need to remember the words of our savior "Let not your hearts be troubled..." (John 14). In my previous parish we used to have a healing service called 'Healing for the Holidays.' This is mainly for those who are feeling lonely and sad amidst all the joys of the celebration. Sometimes we forget the meaning of the festival in the busyness of our lives. Christ has come so that we might have abundant life in the midst of all the troubles and sorrows.

We are an expectant people, **Christ will come again.** In the New Testament there is a clear correlation between anticipating Christ's return and living a more sanctified Christian life. We need to live as "sons of light and

sons of the day, not as of the night or of darkness" (I Thessalonians 5:5). We will find that a healthy anticipation of Jesus' return gives us focus and growth in the spiritual disciplines of our Christian life. We live our lives as though, "Christ died yesterday, rose from the grave today, and is coming back tomorrow."

Christian hope is for an eternal life with God. We look forward to a new heaven and a new earth as John saw in Revelation "Then I saw a new heaven and a new earth, for the first heaven and the first earth passed away...He will wipe every tear from their eyes. There will be no more death, or mourning or crying or pain, for the old order has passed away." (Revelation 21: 1-4). Our lives need not be unhealthy preoccupation with the eschatological events but a disciplined life based on love, truth and compassion so that the kingdom of heaven be in this world. We may also join with the saints to say, "Even so, come, Lord Jesus."
